Rebecca Gibney: Healing the Past

"I was raised in quite a dysfunctional family. We've always felt like there has been a spirit of rejection, I guess, hanging over our family. We've always felt this kind of sense of abandonment. To now know this is something that has come down from the generations, it makes sense."

Last Event: Adventures of Te Henui Cemetery

At our November meeting our guest speaker was Mike Burr, author of *An End of Honour*, a historical novel set in NZ in the 1860s. This novel looks at the Taranaki Land Wars of that time and at Titokowaru's role in these events. I appreciate being able to learn about our history in a well-researched novel rather than a history book! At the end of the book, he notes, "This novel follows the historical record as faithfully as a work of fiction might ... The principal characters existed ..." He gives a short bio at the end for the various characters. I recommend this book if you are interested in Taranaki history of that time.


Mike started his talk by looking at some events in history that have led to social change. (The Black Death, American Civil War, World War 1 and 2.) He used a quote from Rudyard Kipling's *Recessional* (1897) – "The captains and the kings depart...." and looked at the contribution of the ordinary bloke to history. Ordinary people in extraordinary situations.

The second half of his talk was devoted to Titokowaru, whom he called "the forgotten man of NZ history". Titokowaru was outstanding at war tactics, never losing a battle. His strategy was to get the enemy where he wanted them, making them play the way he wanted.

In the 1980s, leading NZ historian, James Belich, argued that Titokowaru's war had become a dark secret of New Zealand history, "forgotten by the Pākehā as a child forgets a nightmare". For Belich, Titokowaru was "arguably the best general New Zealand has ever produced". In 2015, James Belich produced the book, *I Shall not Die. Titokowaru's War, 1868-1869*. In Mike's note at the end of *An End of Honour*, he says he is indebted to Professor James Belich's book.

Mike's talk reminded me that we who live in Taranaki should be mindful of the significance of this area in NZ colonial history.


