Vivienne followed on with her topic "Using Parish Records" in much detail and as usual very interesting to all.


Previous Meeting was David Verran and Seonaid Lewis from Auckland Library - excellent attendance that day and very informative report given regarding Library holdings.

The New Family Search Site (from Pam Hamlyn)

1. The new site now allows wild cards - * or ?

* means no letters or any amount of letters

e.g. jan* will search for Jane, Janet, Janette etc. You could also try J*an* which would also pick up Jean, Jeanette etc.

? means one letter

e.g. ma?y will search for May or Mary

2. Lots of Scottish male baptisms have been missing from the old Family Search site but that they are on the new site.

3. There are shipping lists to New Zealand. Click on "Australia and New Zealand", then "New Zealand, Immigration Passenger Lists, 1855 - 1973"

4. A parent search can be done on the new site. Click on "advanced search", then in the relationship box select "parents". Fill in only the name of the parents to find their children. You can leave out the mother's surname if you wish.

5. Batch number searches are not yet available.

New to the North Shore branch's book collection:

History & Genealogy 2011: Australia & New Zealand Compiled by Alan Phillips and Rosemary Kopittke

This is an "Unlock the Past" publication, which is full of interesting information for family history research.

This is not a HOW-TO book, but rather a collection of articles on a whole range of topics relating to Australia and New Zealand history and genealogy. Everything from key websites, to BDMs, the bombing of Broome, to researching your family in the Hawkesbury region, as well as online genealogy courses, tips for the time poor, Queensland pioneer's and so much more. There is also a section with articles relating to India, Scotland, UK and Germany.

A valuable reference work, not only for the content of the articles, but also for the directory which contains names of 1700 people and organisations around Australian and New Zealand in the history and genealogy field. It contains 66 useful and interesting articles, a directory of organisations and product/service suppliers, advertising for organisations and product/service suppliers.

MORE TIPS FOR CENSUS SEARCH (from Peter Cross)

Tip 15

District search

The advanced search for census databases on www.findmypast.com have quite a range of area search fields, such as ward, ecclesiastical parish, rural district, urban district and parliamentary borough. Using these you can narrow down the area in which you're looking for ancestors. However, because they are taken from the front of the enumerator books, they can be inconsistent.

Similarly, Ancestry.co.uk allows you to home in on a narrow area, for instance to browse an enumeration district. Do not forget the rule that with this type of search, the first and surname boxes must be left blank to ensure that you get a full listing of the inhabitants of the area.

Tip 16

How to find a hospital and locate patients and staff.

In the following examples it is necessary to avoid the boxes for the first name/last name. The boxes we will use are 'relationship to head' and 'keyword'. Ancestry.co.uk has an extensive list of definitions for relationship to the head of household, including 'patient' and 'nurse'. Selecting 'patient' gives 124,298 results, and 'nurse' gives 24,657 results. Reduce the lists to a manageable size using county, gender and birth year boxes only. Ensure the boxes are on the default setting 'All' and search on 'hospital' in the keyword box and your search will show 41,896 results; searching on 'county hospital' will show 747 results. Aim to reduce the list to a manageable size. It must be remembered that the use of the keyword box can give patchy results.

1901 Census for County Leitrim

The 1901 Census of County Leitrim is now available, adding an additional 69,000 records to our online database. The records have been carefully analysed and inputted by staff at Leitrim Genealogy Centre using a Standard Surname field to increase the speed and accuracy of searches.
