

Progress Report: Monumental Transcription Project
North Shore Memorial Park, Schnapper Rock Road Cemetery.

A small team of volunteers have been working on this NZSG project at Schnapper Rock Road Cemetery. The work involves recording the exact location of each headstone or plaque, recording the surname[s] and initials of those buried and taking a clear digital photo of it. The list of names are matched with the appropriate photographs, then using the photograph, all the information from the monumental inscription is entered on computer. This information will then be submitted to the NZSG Project Manager to be indexed and eventually made available for researchers.

A few of us meet at Schnapper Rock Cemetery each Tuesday morning for a couple of hours, weather permitting! We have found that cleaning headstones/plaques if necessary, holding back shrubbery to get a good clear photo/ recording names and location is more enjoyable and rewarding when working in small groups of 2 or 3 people. Also allocating a specific time slot each week, means we have been able to make steady progress through the various sections of the cemetery. Other volunteers prefer to work, usually in pairs, at variable times that better suit themselves. In these instances, they arrange to work in specific sections of the cemetery so that there is no accidental overlap or duplication.

To date, we have been working in the Central Division enclosed within the larger ring road surrounding the crematorium and chapel office, and in Block 6 which is adjacent to Schnapper Rock Road and to the right of the main entrance. We estimate this represents about half of the cemetery currently in use. We have yet to make any significant start on recording the monumental inscriptions of those who have been cremated and have had plaques placed on each brick of the curved walls beside the chapel. There are probably as many individual plaques here as there are burial plots in the whole cemetery. At least this area is paved [i.e.. dry] under foot and sheltered from the wind.

Of course, each week there are additional burials and cremations. Ideally we hope to finish this project as soon as possible and present it as 'complete'.... as at a certain date.

If there are others within our NZSG group who are able to volunteer some time, either at the cemetery or doing computer entry work at home....we would greatly appreciate your help. This could mean volunteering on a regular basis or for short specific periods at a time that suits you. You can join an existing group or make your own arrangements.
