BOOK REVIEWS (Dennise Cook)

WORKHOUSE: The People - The Places - The Life Behind Doors

by Simon Fowler, editor of the National Archives' family history magazine *Ancestors*
(Published 2007)

The book explores all aspects of institutional life, from everyday details of food, uniform and the daily grind, to the scandals that shocked society. It traces the experiences of the guardians and staff, and celebrates the men and women who tried to improve on the official regime. Covers the period between 1834 and the First World War.

Has details of Workhouse Museums, workhouse records, a good bibliography, and index.

STORIES IN STONE: A Field Guide to Cemetery Symbolism and Iconography

Written and photographed by Douglas Keister (Published 2004)

Provides answers to questions from beyond the grave: What religion were they? What clubs and organisations did they belong to? What was their occupation or hobby? What thoughts did they hold about the afterlife? What was their favourite flower?

Contains very detailed information about symbols, their meaning and history, with colour photographs; a list of acronyms of societies, clubs and organisations; and is indexed.

ANZAC INFANTRYMAN 1914-15: From New Guinea to Gallipoli

By Ian Sumner Illustrated by Graham Turner (Published 2011)

Insights into the daily lives of the Australia and New Zealand Army Corps (Anzacs), past and present, detailing their motivation, training, tactics, weaponry and experiences.

Enhanced by detailed illustrations and first-hand contemporary accounts.



NEWS FROM PANMURE

From Thurs 1st September visitors to the FRC will have more flexibility around session times. Some visitors experience problems getting here by 10am or 1pm to start their research, or arrive at 12.15 and either get charged for 2 sessions or have to come back later.

The new opening times & charges for MEMBERS are:

- Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday & 4th Sunday open from 10am – 4pm: daily entry fee \$5
- Wednesday evening 4 – 8pm: \$3
- 1st Friday of the month 4 – 10pm: \$5
- Film reader: \$5 then they can stay in the library for the whole of the session time.

Library users can arrive **anytime between 10am and 4pm** and stay as long, or as short as they like.

So what changes for you?

As far as volunteers are concerned, nothing has changed for you. We will still have a roster that operates on 3-hour sessions as it does now. You will still cash up at 1pm and 4pm, only now you won't have a bottleneck of library users coming and going while you're trying to count money (except on Wednesday evenings & one Friday a month).

It may take a while for people to get used to the new prices and times, so please emphasise the fact that this is of benefit to them – they have much more flexibility as to when they arrive and leave. They can stay 1 hour or 6 hours – it's up to them.

There will be a notice in the next magazine, on the website and on posters around the FRC. The front door sign is being changed as well.

Non-Members:

- Non-Members entry fee will now be \$20 for each of the sessions whether they are a daily session (10-4) or an evening session (4-8, or 4-10) Example: on Monday it will cost them \$20 for the whole day, but if they wanted to stay all day & evening on Wednesday it will cost then \$40; \$20 for the daily session rate & \$20 for the evening session rate.
- As always please try to encourage non-members to join and point out the benefits of being a member, including of course, the cheaper entry fee.
- Film Reader: \$5 for a 2-hour session. No access to library (unless full session fee of \$20 is paid)
