Report on the reconvened 44th AGM of NZSG on Saturday 21st January 2012

There was a very good attendance of 238 members at this the 3rd attempt to pass the necessary reports to enable the NZSG to fulfil the requirements of the Incorporated Societies and Charities Commission. The quorum was exceeded so the reports were passed and new auditors Christmas Grouwland appointed. The list of awards recipients was read out although these had been advised at the two previous gatherings. The President then closed the meeting.

The President then advised the meeting that the Society's solicitor has advised Council that they had no mandate to change the date of closure of nominations for the next council. Therefore the correct date for closure of nominations is 1st December 2011 not 1st February 2012. Any nominations received from 2nd December are invalid. At this point in time the Returning Officer had not been advised so had not made a report. Once the vacant positions (not filled by nominations received by 1st December 2011) are known they will be advertised in the March/April magazine. All vacant positions will be filled by nominations from the floor at the AGM in Taupo. An opportunity to advertise an expression of interest in a position on the website is being investigated. The speaker was then introduced and gave an interesting talk mainly about the importance of gum digging on the settlement of the North Auckland area and the people who came there.

NZSG Far North Branch invites you and your members to participate in the establishment of the Far North Pioneer Register.

In common with other groups creating Pioneer Registers, we aim to retrieve and preserve details of the early settlement of our area by collecting data about the pioneers who settled here before 1900. All genealogists and family historians (whether NZSG members or not) who have ancestors who settled in this region are most welcome to participate by contributing their Far North families' details.

For the purposes of the Register, Far North covers the whole area north of an imaginary line drawn from the Hokianga Harbour to the Whangaroa Harbour.

When sufficient forms have been returned the Branch will create an index to the families for research purposes, and for possible publication at some time in the future. The privacy of contributors will be respected; the original forms will be held securely and will not be publicly accessible.

We would greatly appreciate your assistance in bringing this project to the attention of your membership.
