THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

AUGUST

August the month:

This month was originally named Sextilis in Latin, because it was the sixth month in the original ten-month Roman Calendar, when March was the first month of the year. About 700 BC it became the eighth month when January and February were added to the year before March by King Numa Pompilius, who also gave it 29 days. Julius Caesar added two days when he created the Julian Calendar in 45BC, giving it its modern length of 31 days. In 8 BC it was renamed in honour of Augustus.

The birthstone for August is the peridot or onyxy. The flower is the gladioli or poppy, meaning beauty, strength of character, love, marriage and family.

August the name:

The surname August or Augustine probably derives from St Augustine and in England it fell from popularity at the time of the reformation. The earliest known recording of the name is believed to be John Augustyne in the hundred rolls for Cambridge in 1272.

August as a first name for a boy was quite common in the time of Victoria, but it was more commonly Augustus, which means venerable. For girls it was Augusta. The name August was given to many Polish kings and it remains popular there and in German speaking countries. Variations on the name are Augustine, Augie, Austin, Gus and Guss.

Between 1837 and 1937, free BMD records 249 marriages involving people with the surname August, 387 births and 227 deaths. The NZ historical BDM site shows 67 births, 54 deaths between 1840 and 1940 and 47 marriages between 1840 and 1832.

In the 1891 England and Wales census, there were 185 families with the surname AUGUST, 75 in London, 36 in Surrey,20 in Kent,13 in Hampshire, with the remainder scattered in 1's and 2's in several other counties.

Immigration figures to the United States shows most AUGUST families came from Germany, Sweden and France.

August EVENTS:

AUGUST IS FAMILY HISTORY MONTH: FAMILY HISTORY IS COOL PASS IT ON.

- 1 Aug 1838: slavery abolished in Jamaica. Do you have any slaves or slavers in your tree?
- 3 Aug 1492: Christopher Columbus set sail to find a westerly route to the Far East
- 6 Aug 1945: 1st atomic bomb dropped over Hiroshima.
- 7 Aug 1908: 1st train runs the length of the North Island main trunk line. Although not finished a group of parliamentarians travelled from Wellington to Auckland to meet the American Navy's great white fleet.
- 8 Aug 1915: Wellington Battalion captures Chunuk Bair
- 10 Aug 1840: HMS Britomart arrived at Akaroa and raised the Union Jack ahead of the French. We might be speaking French instead of English.
- 12 Aug 1895 Minnie Dean became the first and only woman to be hanged by law in New Zealand.
- 13 Aug 1961: Berlin wall came into existence. Do you have family who were divided by the wall?
- 17 Aug 1839: NZ Company ship the Tory arrived in Queen Charlotte Sound before sailing on to Wellington. This ship carried members of the Company sent to smooth the way for the following migrant ships. The Tory channel is named after this boat.

23 Aug 1947: 118 single people aged between 20 and 35 arrived aboard the Rangitata as the first draft of assisted migrants since the war. A total of 77,000 people arrived between 1847 and 1975 under this scheme. Do you have family who came to NZ under this scheme or were you one yourself?

24 Aug 79AD Vesuvius erupted and destroyed Pompeii, Stabiae and Herculaneum

26 Aug 1911 the New Zealand coat of arms was warranted by King George V

31 Aug 1997 Princess Diana died in a car crash in Paris
