# From the Magazines and Websites: A bit of a round up.

Users of Ancestry now have access to more than 13 million electoral register entries from <u>Edinburgh</u> and <u>Liverpool</u>, spanning 1832-1966 and 1832-1970 respectively.

Over 164,000 Yorkshire parish records have been uploaded to <u>Findmypast</u>. Covering parishes across the East Riding, the latest additions to the site's <u>Yorkshire Parish Registers and Bishop's Transcripts collection</u> include browse-only scans of baptisms, marriages, banns and burials dating back to the 16th century.

Findmypast also has the **Greater London Marriage Index.** Over 94000 records These new records from the Royal College of Arms cover historic chapels at St James Duke's Place, Gray's Inn, Somerset House and the Austin Friars Dutch Reform Church. Dating back to the early 1500s, the records reveal details of residence, occupation, marriage and spouse. A number also include images of original documents.

Did you have miners who died in mining accidents in Yorkshire, Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire and Leicestershire? Findmypast has added the records, taken from the <u>Alan Beales Database of Fatalities in the Coal Fields</u>, dating back to the 19th century and include the men's year of birth, their date of death and the colliery where the accident took place.

**New in to Our Library:** Family Tree Magazine, Who Do You Think You Are? Magazine March Issues. The Smith family History written by member Nancy Hawks, a local family with lots of connections.

**EASTER:** With Easter coming up at the end of the month, a few comments and articles.

Easter is a 'movable feast' In A.D. 325, the Council of Nicaea set the date of Easter as the Sunday following the paschal full moon, (this is related to the Jewish Calendar date of Passover) which is the full moon that falls on or after the vernal (spring) equinox. In our hemisphere it is the autumnal equinox. In practice, that means that Easter is always the first Sunday after the first full moon that falls on or after March 21.

Easter can occur as early as March 22 and as late as April 25, depending on when the paschal full moon occurs. The church does not use an exact date for the paschal full moon due to differing time zones.

and as FamilySearch point out

"Sometimes pictures, or even events, were identified only by a holiday, such as Easter, and a year. Finding the date of Easter in a given year can help more closely identify a specific date.

Also, some religions did not perform marriages during Lent, the 40 days before Easter. Thus knowing the religion of an ancestor as well as the date of Easter may tell when a couple did *not* marry."

#### Were your Irish ancestors involved in the Easter Rising?

Starting on Easter Monday 24 April 1916 it lasted 6 days. The rising was an attempt by Irish Republicans to end British rule in Ireland. The aim was to establish an independent Irish Rebublic and the timing was deliberately during WW1 while the British were 'distracted'. Several buildings around Dublin were seized and a Rebublic declared, sadly the rebels made an unconditional surrender on Saturday 29 April but not before heavy casualties.

"485 people were killed. About 54% were civilians, 30% were British military and police, and 16% were Irish rebels. More than 2,600 were wounded. Many of the civilians were killed as a result of the British using artillery and heavy machine guns, or mistaking civilians for rebels. Others were caught in the crossfire in a crowded city. The shelling and the fires it caused left parts of inner city Dublin in ruins." (Wikipedia)
